4. List the church's most significant challenges/weaknesses/obstacles.

- a. We are an older congregation. We have lost adherents to the larger churches in the community. A good number of our youth grew up and married and are in the ministry at churches of their own.
- b. There are 63 churches listed in the Beaver County directory in our area of New Brighton, Beaver Falls, Chippewa, Beaver, Rochester, Bridgewater, and Fallston. We need to find a way to make our church known and relevant in this community, to have a mission. We need to "advertise" our church. Marion Hill has become an older population, so we need to expand our outreach.

Pastoral Expectations

1. OUR PRIORITIES FOR THE PASTORAL ROLE (highest priority to lowest priority)

- PREACHER / TEACHER Gives significant attention to preparation for sermons and other Biblical instruction and can effectively communicate the Biblical knowledge and its life's applications.
- SHEPHERD / CARE GIVER the church leader's job is to watch out and care for the congregation by having the Spirit given capacity and desire to serve God by overseeing, training, and caring for the needs of the congregation.
- INTERCESSOR Is a prayer warrior for his congregation: a ministry of prayer as a major pastoral role.
- EVANGELISM Relates to unbelievers, brings people to a faith in Christ. Leads the congregation in reaching out to the community around us.
- DISCIPLESHIP / DISCIPLER He is a follower of Jesus. Mentors others in their commitment to follow Christ. Gives focused attention to the development and the effective operation of discipleship ministries of the church.
- LEADER / VISION CASTER Clarifies the direction of the church, maintains core values, leads in the establishment and evaluation of strategies, and mobilizes the congregation to fulfill its vision.
- ADMINISTRATOR Effectively manages the congregation in its day-to-day ministries and operations.
- MISSIONS PROMOTER Develops a theology of missions for the congregation and challenges its members to financial, prayer, and other means of support in the spread of the gospel around the world.
- COUNSELOR Gives wise, Biblical counsel for a variety of spiritual and emotional needs.
- LEADERSHIP DEVELOPER Promotes a culture of raising up lay leaders and works actively to equip, support, and encourage these leaders.
- COMMUNITY LEADER Engages with activities, problems and needs of the surrounding community and leads the church to have an influence in the community.
- RITUAL OVERSEER Gives priority to important transition rituals such as dedications, marriages, and funerals in the lives of individuals and families. Plans activities to make such times as meaningful as possible.

He would form a relationship with the churches in the area, not just New Brighton. Fellowship with the other CMA pastors in Beaver County and the surrounding counties.


He would enjoy a variety of musical styles, both the old hymns and contemporary music.

CHURCH HISTORY

Our church had its beginnings in a small chapel that was located between 41st and 43rdStreets near the old Marion Hill School building (now an apartment building). It was built in 1870 by Mr. and Mrs. Gregg McKee, who were devout Presbyterians. It was the first church in our community. There came a time when interest lagged, and it was thought that the chapel might be closed. Consequently, the late Mrs. John (Birdie Mennell) Cable and the late Mrs. William (Ethel Shaffer) Court staged a visitation campaign and people returned to the chapel to worship. The late Rev. R.R. Brown, then pastor of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church of Beaver Falls, came to preach and assist in the development of the church.

The Sunday School grew and in a short time, the chapel was filled. Classes were large and numerous, and since it was difficult to present god's word in such a small building, we realized the time had come to make plans for a larger facility. In 1922, the late Rev. Charles N Van Arsdale became our first pastor. After much prayer, he too felt that God would have us take a step of faith and begin planning. In time, we were able to purchase the lot on which the present church is located, and in 1927, our new church was dedicated. We were so thankful that God had provided a beautiful place of worship! Rev. Van Arsdale was our pastor until 1934 and was truly a good shepherd to us.

The late Rev. M.J. Boyd was our pastor from 1934-1943. His messages on prophecy will always be remembered, and our congregation continued to grow. Rev. Paul Freligh, a former missionary, was our pastor from 1941-1944. Rev. Milton Scripture was our pastor from 1944 until 1949, and through his untiring efforts, God continued to bless. Rev. J.K. Bellig was our pastor from 1949-1970. Our Sunday School and church were growing, and again we needed more space. With God's guidance, an addition was built on to the present structure and dedicated to the Lord in 1957. A few years later we felt the need for a recreation center, so the Alliance Fellowship Center was built and dedicated in 1962. How we marveled at God's goodness to us! The church's first organ was purchased during Rev. Bellig's ministry. Rev. Paul Cochran served as our Youth Director from 1967-1970.

Rev. Clyde Davis Sr. came to us in 1970. By this time all our properties were debt-free, and we needed more space, so it was decided we should build another addition. This annex, dedicated on August 20, 1972, gave us more room in the sanctuary and more classrooms. Again, we marvel at goodness of God. Rev. Davis was our pastor until 1983.

In 1984 Rev. Wayne Young came to us. He served as pastor until God called him home in 1997.

Rev. James Krouse served as pastor from 1997 until May 2023 when he retired from the ministry.

One hundred and fifty-three years of ministering to Marion Hill and the surrounding communities. We humbly thank God for His goodness and marvel at His grace. We pray that God grants Marion Hill Alliance many more years to serve these communities.
